

Interview Analysis: Writing as Data Familiarisation

Volunteer, student, supervisee, colleague, locum: Multiple relationships, subjectivity. Conversation flows.

"I've always sung, always."
"They just want to sing."
Connecting through music.

Beginnings, endings – and next time?
Tolerating uncertainty – in life too.

Interview Analysis: Linear Analysis

Musicking as Identity

I've always sung, always:

Little solos at six, school choirs: the western choral tradition, everyone so still;

Now ukulele groups and neuro choirs.

I'd like to set up a similar group, but I'd need to think about sustainability.
