DOING RESEARCH THAT MATTERS: TRANSLATING A SOUTH AFRICAN EXPERIENCE TO AUSTRALIA

The reality for the majority of school leavers in township and rural communities in South Africa is that they will not be able to find steady employment. These young people lose hope, become disillusioned and despondent, and often slide into dysfunctional ways – e.g., crime, substance abuse, entering into unhealthy relationships. Yet, there is much potential within these young people if only they can learn to harness and improve their lives and the lives of others. I will share with you some of the ways the South African University partnered with community to conduct research that led to sustainable, relevant and ethical change. I invite you to consider these ways and share your ideas on the pressing issue and solutions to youth unemployment from an Australian perspective.
